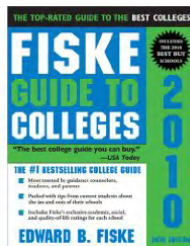


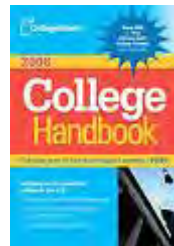
GUIDEBOOKS CAN HELP YOUR COLLEGE SEARCH
